The highlights of the business portion of the meeting, were the announcement of the slate of officers nominated for 2014-2016, and defeat of a by-law recommendation to increase GFWC dues by \$5. It failed by four votes, with those opposing making the argument that there were enough women who would resign and thus clubs would be lost because these women could not afford the increase. This issue was referred to the by-law committee for further study.

Guest speaker Diane Valle spoke on the Marathon

Daffodil project. The goal is to line the entire Boston Marathon route with daffodils that will hopefully be in full bloom on race day. She met her first goal and now has increased both the number of daffodils as well as the number of plant placements along the route. Every

## Wear Red February is Heart Health Month

- Heart disease is the No. 1 killer of women, and is more deadly than all forms of cancer combined.
- Heart disease causes 1 in 3 women's deaths each year, killing approximately one woman every minute.
- An estimated 43 million women in the U.S. are affected by heart disease.
- Ninety percent of women have one or more risk factors for developing heart disease.
- Since 1984, more women than men have died each year from heart disease.

- The symptoms of heart disease can be different in women and men, and are often misunderstood.
- While 1 in 31 American women dies from breast cancer each year, 1 in 3 dies of heart disease.
- Only 1 in 5 American women believe that heart disease is her greatest health threat.
- Women comprise only 24 percent of participants in all heart-related studies.





### There's No Better Time to Wear Red

Every day, GWFC Program Partner **The Heart Truth** and its supporters empower women to live for their hearts. But there's one day each year when the message is loudest.

On February 7, 2014 -National Wear Red Day® - Americans across the country will wear red in unison to call attention to women's heart health. Studies show that heart disease is the number one killer of women in the U.S.. Unfortunately, most women do not make the connection between risk factors, such as high blood pressure and high cholesterol, and their personal risk of getting heart disease.

On National Wear Red Day, remind women that they can protect their hearts, starting with a visit to the doctor to learn about their personal risk factors.
