Lynne Jorge read the list of awards our club won




including the overall award of the Silver Bowl. We had sparkling cider to toast the hard work our club has done to raise money and for

four are junior members.

Sunday 30th: Our club is taking part in the Memorial Day Parade for the first time. Mary Barrett is chairing the committee. Our president has written letters requesting donations to local stores and has received at least 10 packages of water to be given out with our club name and website attached. We will be walking with our banner along the parade route and passing out water and hopefully talking to future club members along the route!

Flower Power Fundraising: Edie spent a lot of time with the Flower Power fundraising people at the International Convention in Memphis. She thought this would be a good fundraiser for our club. She brought the idea to the executive board and got permission to bring it to a business meeting to propose it to the full membership. Once agreed upon Eddie then took off with the idea and organized it for the month of March. The club made a 50% profit on everything we sold and GFWC in Washington got an additional 5%. We sold nearly \$1100 with \$55 going to GFWC in Washington, and us a profit of about \$572. The money raised is going to be utilized for female veterans. Edie has contacted Richard Leahy from Brockton to get a list of what the 2 groups of Female vets need the most.

Relay for Life: Our club is once again organizing a Relay for Life Team with Team Captain Denise Wheeler. Progress is being made to cure cancer; this is good news, but obviously, there is more to do. Perhaps it's time to let go.Let go of...**Outcomes** – Allow things to unfold differently than you imagined. The way you see the outcome determines what it will mean to you, not the outcome itself. Fear – When you are afraid, you project thoughts, attitudes, and beliefs onto people and situations creating serious leadership blind spots. **Knowing** – When you let go of knowing you create room for learning. Otherwise, you are stuck.

Proving – Trying to prove to someone else that you are "worthy" or that you deserve "respect" is a bottomless pit. **Importance** – Needing people to need you is not healthy. It leads to creating problems that only you can solve. **Comparison** – Be true to yourself and stick to the path your heart has given you. Your journey is unique.(S. Mabry, 2015, Letting-Go Leadership) I have found that one of the hardest things about leadership is learning to let go, discerning when the people under your care are ready to stand on their own. It's often much sooner than you could ever imagine. (Miller, 2015, Leadership Means Learning to Let Go) Sometimes good leadership is knowing when to let go and let others grow. After reading this I realized that we are doing our best to follow this rule. We have an influx of new members, which means new potential leaders. They will allow the older members to step back a bit ,but be helpful consultants and guides. Newer members bring in fresh ideas. Our job is to encourage, support, and of course to let go when necessary.
