What Did We Do in May?

Monday May 6th Business Meeting: Women's History & Resource was represented by Denise Wheeler in Nancy Brown's absence. This month the

woman chosen was Sally Ride, an American astronaut, physicist, and engineer. Born in Los Angeles, she joined NASA in 1978 and became

the first American woman in space in 1983.
Ride was the third woman in space overall.
Ride remains the youngest American astronaut to have traveled to space, having done so at the age of 32. After flying twice on the Orbiter Challenger, she left NASA in 1987. She worked for two years at Stanford University's Center for International Security and Arms Control, then at the University of California, San Diego as a professor of physics. She served on the committees that investigated the Challenger and Columbia space shuttle disasters, the only person to participate in both. Ride died of pancreatic cancer on July 23, 2012.

on the two conferences by Robin Gendron and Edith Edlund. Cindy Brogan brought the two matching quilts her daughter Mary Ellen Founds


and Cindy as women veterans received at the GFWC of Massachusetts Conference.


ADVOCATES FOR CHILDREN: - Nora Orfanello & Robin Broberg- Advocates for Children week is September 19-26.


