

The GFWC Taunton and Raynham Jr. Woman's Club's membership recently grew with two additional members installed at the club's March meeting at the Silver Platter Restaurant inside Bristol Plymouth Technical High School.

Acting president Cindy Brogan presented them with the GFWC pin welcoming them into the club.

The guest speaker keeping with the theme of Women History Month was the recently elected first female mayor of Taunton, Shaunna O'Connell. Mayor O'Connell spoke on how she got to where she is today. Never intending to become



a public servant she however was outrage when she had seen news broadcast concerning a child kidnapping in Florida in 2005. Being a young mother she was affected by the kidnapping of the 10 year old girl who was kidnapped, raped and killed by a repeat offender. She decided then to make a difference to help protect potential victims and reduce a sexual offender's ability to reoffend. This began her unintentional journey into politics. She became involved with a local advocate



group of 20-25 mothers to draw up the Jessica Law and helped to bring it to the legislative branch and become a law. When she ran for Massachusetts State Representatives she was assisted by our member Fran Perry and

won by 31 votes. She is now the 50th mayor of

Taunton. She feels Taunton is a big city with a small town feel. She was accompanied to the meeting by Kelly Dooner and Dennis Ackerman whose wife Judy is the club's Programs Chairperson. Acting President Cindy Brogan presented the mayor with a gift basket as a thank you for visiting



the club. The mayor then took a picture with the membership, which appeared in the Taunton Gazette.

An enjoyable time was had by those attending members with a March of Dimes Toss held to raise funds for the cause organized by Advocates for

Children Chairperson Robin Broberg. Members were asked to bring dimes with them to the meeting. Two mini Irish pots of gold were set up, members picked numbers 2 of each number. Starting with the first number ones, they stepped up and tossed what dimes they brought attempting to get them in the tiny pot. Then the 2.s etc. down the line; it brought about a lot of laughs and

some competiveness. Judy Ackerman and Jane Pacheco were the big winners. Everyone who participated won a golden coin. This event raised \$51.25 that out Treasurer Nancy Clark forwarded to the March of Dimes. In addition, Leadership Co-Chairwomen Joan Rainville Curran and Paula Gasparonii tested the members' observational skills with a Mix It Up Game. Members were

asked to remove 3 items from their person. The



members were then divided into two groups one on each side of the room and

members had to guess what members had removed. Cindy Leonard was the big winner with 6 right answers; other winners were Vel Bleau, Debbie Chaplin and Cheryl Carlos. Membership Chairman Joyce Clark noted she has purchased new totes and club pens for new member gifts and will also be selling the totes to members for \$5.25.

What has our club been up to this March?

This pass month the Education Chairman wrote letters and contacted the 7 high schools Taunton, Bridgewater-Raynham, Dighton Rehoboth, Bristol Plymouth, Bristol County Agricultural, Somerset-Berkley, and Apponequet Regional gifting each school with a \$500 scholarship to be given to a

female graduating senior continuing their education with a community service background totaling \$3,500. Our members are from the cities and towns of Taunton, Raynham, Berkley, Dighton and Rehoboth, Somerset, Assonet, Brockton and Lakeville.

A \$50 donation was made from our club by the selling of the Dine-Out Books by Fran Perry to Home for Our Troops. She has done this fundraiser for several years and has brought in several hundreds of dollars, Thank-you Fran.

Our club members made their favorite soups and

pies and helped to serve them up at a Soup Sampler an Pie Fundraiser on Saturday March 7th at the American Legion Hall in



Raynham. For \$10 each participant was able to

taste as many delicious

homemade soups and pies until they burst at the seams. A raffle with gift cards gathered by

members from area restaurants and local businesses was conducted by Cindy Brogan. This enjoyable

meeting. Here are some facts about our countries former United States Permanent Representative to the United Nations. Nikki was born in Bamberg, South Carolina, a daughter of Indian immigrants and

proud graduate of Clemson University. Her first job was at the age of 13 keeping the books for her family's clothing store. She was elected in 2010 as the first female Governor of South Carolina and reelected in 2014. She served until she was confirmed by the U.S. Senate in 2017 as U.S. Permanent Representative to the United Nations. Quote: "My best advice is to always trust your gut. If you pause or second guess yourself, push through the fear. When you do, you will surprise yourself with just how strong you are."

Committees:

Advocates for Children - Robin Broberg - Hundreds of thousands of vulnerable U.S. children could face a heightened risk of abuse and neglect as coronavirus-related school closures keep them at home and away from the nation's biggest group of hotline tipsters: educators. Teachers, administrators, school counselors and other educational professionals report one in every five child-mistreatment claims in the nation, according to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Other major sources include law enforcement and social workers. Those reports could plummet, experts predict, as children's social circles contract to just family members, which collectively represent just 12% of hotline calls. Even kids in otherwise functional families could face peril as parents unaccustomed to providing roundthe-clock care and stressed by the collapsing economy are pushed to the edge. Calls to the group's National Parent Helpline for families in crisis have spiked 30% in the past week, Pion-Berlin said. They're coming from mothers and fathers

stressed about child care, food insecurity and other fears arising from the coronavirus crisis. The Childhelp National Child Abuse Hotline also has seen a 10% surge this week in calls and texts. Rather than reporting abuse, however, some of the callers are anxious parents seeking help with child care and frightened children stuck at home with their abusers. Stress is a factor in coronavirus pandemic. Of children who are sexually abused, 90% know the perpetrator. Staying home could make those children more vulnerable. If you know of any child or family that fits this profile try to phone or video chat with them. But children who have not yet come to social workers' attention remain at higher risk. Take an active role in monitoring child safety in your community. Everyone needs to have a more watchful eye on children if you suspect anything is wrong.


