Denise Wheeler Environment Chairman shared




her expertise on what and how to recycle items. Once again she brought items she has collected to share with the membership.

LEGISLATION/ PUBLIC POLICY – Nancy Clark – with local and state legislators running for office, it's the perfect time to get a photo with a current legislator and post it on Facebook, Twitter, or Instagram with the "#GFWCadvocacy"/tag. There has been a new legislative alert: Online platforms have fueled the extreme and unprecedented proliferation of child sexual abuse material. Law enforcement has repeatedly warned that children are groomed, enticed, exploited, trafficked, and abused online through platforms we use every day. This has only increased during the COVID-19 pandemic. In 2021, 29.3 million reports of child sexual abuse material were made to the Cyber Tip line hosted by the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children (NCMEC), the nation's

clearinghouse and comprehensive reporting center for all issues related to the prevention of and recovery from child victimization. Technology companies have the photo DNA technology, but have not had the accountability. This legislation provides a pathway forward. Advocates believe that removing technology companies' immunity from civil and criminal liability for third party content on their platforms will result in a dramatic decrease in online child sexual exploitation. It is time to work with technology companies and encourage them to do the right thing – Stop Online Child Sexual Exploitation! If you have not received this reapply to Call for Action!
